very useful profit of £113-5s-5d. Our first nurse was Anna Prickett, a qualified nurse and midwife, born in Pembroke in Wales. At the time of the 1911 census she was 28 years old and boarding at the Horseshoes Inn. In 1914 she married Henry Horne, a gamekeeper lodging in Clay Street with Ann and James Mayes, and they moved to Westleton. District Nurses were paid about £60 a year, plus uniform and bicycle.
